Section I - Federal Formula Funding Opportunities

Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA)-Funded New York State Workforce Development Boards

Funding through WIOA is the primary source of federal support for local workforce development activities. Funding is allocated by formula to New York State, which then provides funding to local Workforce Development Boards (WDBs) for the planning and implementation of local workforce development initiatives. Local WDBs are required to support employment and training activities in "in-demand" occupations, as defined by local WDBs in consultation with the New York State Department of Labor. It is important to note that WIOA formula funds do not typically fund training providers directly. Rather, funds flow through individuals by way of Individual Training Accounts (ITAs) to institutions to pay for the costs of training. New York has 33 local WDBs spread throughout each geographic region of the state. WDBs are organized at the county or intracounty level in some regions.

Perkins Postsecondary Career & Technical Education (CTE) Program

<u>Vocational Education (Career and Technical) Grants to States</u>, administered by the Department of Labor, is authorized under the Title I of the *Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act*. Perkins CTE provides federal funds to states in order to develop academic, career, and technical skills of secondary and postsecondary students who enroll in career and technical education programs.

Trade Adjustment Assistance (TAA) for Workers

Authorized under the under the <u>Trade Adjustment Assistance Reauthorization Act of 2015</u>, TAA helps trade-affected workers adjust to job loss due to the impact of international trade. TAA benefits include funding for retraining and weekly income support payments while affected workers are enrolled in training. TAA is administered jointly by the Department of Labor and cooperating state agencies, namely the New York State Department of Labor. The federal Department of Labor is responsible for investigating group petitions to establish program eligibility. The New York State Department of Labor is responsible for administering federally funded benefits to eligible workers.

Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (AEFLA) Funding

<u>Adult Education and Family Literacy Act</u> (AEFLA) funding, administered by the Department of Education, supports basic education for out-of-school adults. Referred to as "adult education," the programs and activities funded by AEFLA support educational services at the secondary level and below, as well as English language training. The New York State Department of Education distributes funding to eligible local entities, who provide the educational services to individuals.

Community Development Block Grants (CBDGs)

<u>Community Development Block Grants</u> (CDBG), administered through the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), is a flexible program that provides "funds to address a wide range of unique community development needs." Each state then provides their CDBG funds to local governments to support infrastructure improvement, economic development, public services and community facilities projects. Eligible activities include "economic development and job creation/retention activities."

Social Services Block Grants (SSBG)

Administered through the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Administration for Children & Families (ACF), <u>Social Services Block Grants</u> provide funding to states and territories to support a <u>variety of local initiatives</u> for children and adults, including "<u>education and training</u> <u>services</u> to help meet the social service needs of affected individuals."

Community Services Block Grants (CSBG)

The <u>Community Services Block Grants</u> (CSBG) program administered by the Administration for Children & Families (ACF) provides funding to states, territories, and tribes for distribution to local agencies to support a wide range of community-based activities, to include projects that lessen poverty in communities, address the needs of low-income individuals, and provide services related to employment, education, housing, nutrition, emergency services and/or health.

<u>Section II – Competitive Federal Funding</u> <u>Opportunities</u>

The following is a brief, non-comprehensive listing of competitive grants that may be useful for local workforce development initiatives. These funding opportunities may or may not be in-cycle depending on the time of year and status of Congressional appropriations to fund these programs. Grantseekers are encouraged to monitor <u>Grants.gov</u> for grant programs that are currently open for applications. The CFDA numbers included with the program information below can be a useful way to search Grants.gov for funding opportunities.¹

- <u>Apprenticeship Building America (ABA) Grant Program</u> (CFDA <u>17.285</u>): the Department of Labor continues to support grants for the Registered Apprenticeship Grant program. These <u>State Apprenticeship Expansion</u> grants have been used to expand registered apprenticeship programs for adults and youth in states including in industry sectors such as: IT, cybersecurity, manufacturing, health care, and mental health care.
- <u>National Dislocated Workers Grants</u> (DWGs) (CFDA <u>17.277</u>): the Department of Labor provides temporary DWG funding to states and local areas to respond to large unexpected economic events which cause significant job losses. Funding is used to create temporary training programs to help reemploy unemployed workers. States may sub-grant a portion of funds to <u>local workforce development boards</u> and/or may expend funds through public and private agencies and organizations engaged in approved projects.
- <u>Strengthening Community Colleges Training Grants Program</u> (CFDA <u>17.261</u>): the Department of Labor funded this <u>Skills Training Grant</u> program to help build the capacity of community colleges to address workforce challenges by providing training in a variety of industries, including health care, logistics, and cybersecurity.
- <u>H-1B Skills Training Grants and H-1B Rural Healthcare Grants</u> (CFDA <u>17.268</u>): the Department of Labor administers this <u>Skills Training Grant</u> program to "provide a range of training and education services that lead to middle- and high-skilled jobs in healthcare occupations. These services include assessment, coaching and counseling, and occupational skills training models that lead to recognized Postsecondary credentials."
- <u>Reentry Employment Opportunities Programs</u> (REO) are administered by DOL to develop or expand employment opportunities for adults, justice-involved youth, and young adults who were formerly incarcerated. Recently funded REO programs include:
 - <u>Pathway Home 3</u> (CFDA 17.270): the Pathway Home 3 grant initiative supports occupational training aligned with their career and educational goals, and provides funding for services, such as case management, legal assistance, and transportation that support participants' participation and success. The goals of the grant include: Providing individuals incarcerated in state correctional facilities or local or county jails with workforce services prior to release and to continue services after release by

transitioning the participants into reentry programs in the communities to which they will return.

- <u>Young Adult Reentry Partnership (YARP) 2 (CFDA 17.270</u>): The purpose of this
 program is to partner organizations that provide reentry services with community
 colleges to provide education and training services to improve the employment
 outcomes for young adults involved in the criminal justice system.
- <u>Fidelity Bonding Demonstration Grants (CFDA 17.270</u>): Through this grant program, DOL intends to help those "involved in the criminal justice system, including ex-offenders recovering from opioid and other drug addictions, obtain employment in family-sustaining jobs; better inform employers about the knowledge, skills, and abilities of this population; and advancing strategies to address the barriers to reemployment." The DOL's Employment Training Administration (ETA) provides fidelity bonds to employers to help reduce the risks of hiring individuals whose criminal backgrounds pose barriers to securing employment.
- <u>Workforce Pathways for Youth</u> (DOL) (<u>CFDA 17.261</u>): is intended to connect youth to job training and workforce pathways, including soft skill development, career exploration, job readiness and certification, summer jobs, year-round job opportunities, and apprenticeships.
- <u>YouthBuild</u> (CFDA): (<u>CFDA 17.274</u>) administered by the Department of Labor, YouthBuild provides a pre-apprenticeship program model that encompasses education, occupational skills training, leadership development, and high-quality post-program placement opportunities to opportunity youth. YouthBuild is a community-based alternative education program for youth between the ages of 16 and 24 who left high school prior to graduation that also have other risk factors.

Casework Form

If you have encountered a problem involving a federal government agency or federally subsidized benefit that you have not been able to successfully resolve, Senator Kirsten Gillibrand's staff of constituent liaisons may be able to assist you in the following areas:

Employment Issues: including assistance with disability benefits, employer-provided health care plans and COBRA, Family Medical Leave Act (FMLA) benefits, pensions, unemployment benefits, Federal and State Workers Compensation claims, and retirement-related issues.

Consumer Affairs: including assistance obtaining a home loan modification under the Making Home Affordable Program, insurance claims, dissatisfaction with consumer products or services, environmental regulations, and concerns regarding air quality, water or land contamination.

Immigration Issues: including issues with visitor visas, family and employment based visas, lawful permanent resident status, naturalization, international adoptions, detention, passports, customs and border issues, and assistance to American Citizens in crisis abroad.

Veteran Issues: including issues with VA pension and disability benefits, education benefits, veteran burial or funeral issues, and issues regarding the VA medical centers.

IRS Issues: including connecting constituents with the Taxpayer Advocate Service to address federal tax issues including lost or delayed tax refunds, penalty abatements, payment installation plans, tax credits, referrals to IRS Low Income Tax Clinics and paper tax forms.

Military Issues: including issues pertaining to the Department of Defense, Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, Coast Guard, Reserves and New York State National Guard, as well as obtaining military records, medals and academy nominations.

Health Care Issues: including issues with Medicare and Medicaid, health insurance, insurance providers, nursing homes, hospitals, prescription drugs, and 9/11 health matters.

Social Security: including issues with Supplemental Security Income, Social Security Disability, survivors' benefits, and retirement benefits.

Social Services: including issues with food stamps, HEAP (low-income heating program), FEMA and disaster relief, and issues related to federally subsidized housing.
